social goodwill thrive. An instructor and campus garden director for 13 years at one the nation's best two-year landscape programs, his early career at <u>Sandhills Community College</u> has shaped his professional role as a consensus builder through knowledge.

Throughout his career, he has served as preferred expert, instructor, author, lecturer, speaker and board member. History, economics, politics and community need play a vital role in his perspective. The application of that knowledge is evidenced in Robert's role in the sustained progression of his own County, through influencing small business development and sound public policy.

In the mid-1990s, Robert sought to protect a small community of three historic towns with differing views on development, during a time of steady population growth. Among them was the Village of Pinehurst in North Carolina, originally master-planned by Frederick Law Olmsted's office and implemented by Warren Manning.

Robert understood the towns were in jeopardy of losing their unique historic character, based on incongruent development ordinances that failed to manage modernization along their busiest roads. He opened a dialogue between governing bodies to proactively align their policies. As a result, Robert co-authored the 1995 Moore County Highway Corridor Protection and Development Plan that gained the support of hundreds of businesses and land owners, **a 1998 NCASLA Merit Award Project**. Still in effect today, the plan gained recognition as a model to other small towns in cohesive policy planning.

Robert's study of community politics, Manning's work and development patterns and local business needs led to more than 25 years of collaboration with the Village of Pinehurst's leaders. He coauthored the Village's first Unified Development Ordinance, the biggest step in modernization of its development policies to date. He crafted open-space and parking studies, designed public parks to stimulate economic growth, and community activities.

He has also worked with the Village's largest stakeholder and landowner, <u>Pinehurst Resort</u>, for the past 30 years to preserve, protect and perpetuate Olmsted Firm's vision within the context of the resort's objectives, **leading to two NCLSA Awards.**

His longstanding influence within this National Historic Landmark District provides a forum to educate and further unify the community on sound policy, while fostering enduring public-private partnerships.

A trusted voice, Robert has also become an invested advocate for land use planning in the region, serving in leadership roles at the local and county level. Those appointments include Chairman of the Moore County Land Use Planning Committee, Moore County Planning Board Chairman, and Member of the Moore County Environmental Quality Board, among others. He also served as Vice Chair of Pinehurst's UDO Rewriting Committee, to prepare the community for continued growth within its rich context.

With his primary focus on practicing Landscape Architecture, he was also running a small business. Which gave him insight for his parallel rails of interest- resilient built environments and sound business strategy.

Other than his childhood lawn mowing summer job and operating a family farm nursery that produced 250,000 plants per year while being an instructor at Sandhills Community College, Robert's business

At the outset of his consulting practice business was all about doing good work. After nine years of trying to do that and run the family farm he read an article in HBR by Michael Porter tilted *What is Strategy?* He interests and efforts were made clear. Business strategy was the answer to success business operations. From that time and continuing today, Robert's quest to learn and apply the principles of strategy in small businesses is a passion. He now consults over one hundred small businesses and co-owns eight businesses.

Putting things into practice he started a new full-service landscape contracting company in 1999 with two partners. Integrating business strategy principles and sound operational processes, the company was profitable within three years. Today it is a model of small business performance with annual revenues of \$4.5 million with 48 employees.

Beyond his business and civic activities, he has also impacted the historic resort industry, where a balance between heritage and contemporary land uses has been sought. As the resident landscape architect for 12 years at <u>The Homestead</u>, a 3,000-acre historic property in Virginia's Allegany Mountains, Robert guided responsible land use by informing owners, citizens, state regulators and staff of the lasting benefit of effective planning. **His long-term commitment**

to preserving the unique character of the 18th century property led to an NCASLA Honor Award, and an ANLA American Garden Superior Award.

Similar work was performed at the <u>Mt.</u> <u>Washington Resort</u> in New Hampshire, where Robert worked with the resort developers, architects, local botanists and wildlife biologists to design and install a green roof in one of the most extreme locations in the country. In a region with many ecological zones, Mt. Washington averages 100 days of recorded hurricane-force winds at its peak and sub-zero temperatures.

Building a team of local experts and researching plant materials in various micro-hardiness zones was key to the success of the project. The resulting garden can survive the harshest winters, features more than 20 indigenous plant species, and is a place of immense beauty and popularity for guests, year-round.

In each case, the student researching each region's intrinsic character

became the instructor to many executives, town leaders, staff and citizens on responsible site use and development through Landscape Architecture.

Stewardship and Strategy

Robert's involvement for what has become sustainability has produced a significant impact on the built environment. Both in theory and policy, his diligence in studying, educating and employing sound business and design principles has inspired others.

In 1992, Robert was hired as the onsite landscape architect for the <u>Duke University Levine Science Resource Center</u> project. Prior to Robert's arrival, several campus building projects had been poorly planned and suffered from several risk factors such as site erosion, invasive weed growth, and soil impermeability, mostly due to non-indigenous soil and plant choices.

An expert in local soils and an author of North Carolina Plant manuals, Robert was specifically sought by Carol Johnson & Associates to convert the 700-space parking lot into a viable landscape surrounding the new building. Moreover, he was selected for construction management of the entire project, uniting architects, engineers and campus leaders under one cause. Using all locally based materials, **the project was cited by Duke University as the** standard by which all new projects were to be designed. The **project would also be lauded by the NCASLA in 1995** for its commitment to sustainability and the project's ability to control future risk.

More than 15 years later, Robert would return to the campus to orchestrate the smart-sustainable landscape design and construction at the <u>Duke Smart Home</u>. One of 150 national pilot projects for the Sustainable Sites Initiative, the on-campus training facility included both a "smart home" and now sustainable landscape.

Water management played a significant role in Robert's collaborative work with scientists and student partners. Through extensive use of bioswales, filters, storage, plant selections and innovative stormwater management systems, the final design could reduce water consumption by as much as 70 percent.

The result is not only scientifically sound in promoting sustainable ecosystems that benefit on-site residents, the University and visitors, but provides a new and innovative pathway to landscape installation and maintenance. It is physical proof that leaders can see, understand, show and use to offer consideration of the SITES initiative.

The project, completed in 2012, gained the interest of numerous U.S. congressmen and state officials, as

well as the EPA, GSA and other governmental agencies.

Furthermore, Robert has served as the American Nurseries and Landscape Association's representative to first drafts of SITES Manual 2010 and was a driving force in creating the Greenscape Business Alliance. The latter drew a seemingly disparate group of horticultural, landscape, business, trade and industry leaders to work together to explore landscape stewardship through sustainability.

Not only was Robert involved in helping set a precedent for such organizations to work together, but he has been an essential player in clarifying critical elements and finding common ground on the topic of sustainability.

Purpose and Influence

Where most Landscape Architects are content to build a viable practice and create exceptional designs, Robert has forged an unconventional career path. Empowered with innate leadership ability, his influence has impacted many, both inside and outside his chosen field.

During his six-year tenure on the NCASLA board, Robert leveraged relationships with state legislators to convert North Carolina to a practice state. The act forever promoted Landscape Architecture as a profession.

A gifted instructor, Robert was the featured lecturer at the 2007 ANLA Management Clinic and was noted as an expert in strategic company management. He created an exclusive landscape business program, entitled <u>Optimum Provision Management</u>, to help service providers improve operations. It is widely accepted by many landscape companies today, and was featured in a book entitled, *"The Professional Entrepreneur – When Cowboys Grow Up,"* published in 2010, by Dr. Bill Hildeblot.

Meeting and becoming a friend of Bill Hildebolt was another turning point in Robert's career path. Bill invited Robert to introduce Optimum Provision Management (OPM) to his company which lead to a conversation about several failed attempts Bill had made in expanding his business. After learning how Bill had approached business expansion, Robert offered a totally different way to scale the business. Bill and Robert joined forces with two other small business owners to expand the Brand.

The misfortune of Bill's death caused by cancer in 2020, has resulted in Robert and his partners advancing Bill's legacy. Today they are positioning Nature's Select as the leader in biologically enhanced lawn and plant care in North Carolina.

With a talent in connecting the right people at the right time, Robert influenced a significant economic development project in herbal medicine between China and Western North Carolina. Through his six-year tenure on the <u>North Carolina Arboretum</u> board of directors, he opened a pathway to discourse between leaders, state senators and Hunan Province representatives. Recognized by the Governor, it fulfills the Arboretum's mission to champion market opportunities for North Carolina-based specialty crop growers.

He also became the Landscape Architectural representative for "<u>A Growing Interest,</u>" a national conference convened by the Institute for Global Environmental Strategies and supported by the NOAA National Climatic Data Center, in 2008. The two-day meeting

drew public and private groups together to examine the impacts of climate change on the plant sector.

The opening dialogue resulted in a follow-up meeting four years later - "A Growing Interest 2" – where Robert served as the keynote speaker, among several governmental and scientific experts. Robert laid the groundwork for meaningful dialogue by outlining the key players and challenges facing the entire landscape profession. In his opening remarks he shared thoughts from over 20 landscape architect and plant-sector leaders to lead the two-day discussion, creating a shared voice among landscape professionals.

Over the past 8 years, Robert and his associates at LKC have served as campus Landscape Architects at <u>High Point University</u> in Hight Point, North Carolina.Our contributions have helped establish HPU as a resort campus.

Beyond his 48 years of practice, Robert is continually sought as an advisor on such projects of major significance, where decisions produce enduring change.

In this unorthodox approach to erase boundaries, he has broken many stereotypes for Robert's career path. He humbly leads by example with integrity, knowledge and great empathy, gaining trust in nearly any forum. He engages in leadership in ways in which others can benefit, both professionally and practically. He is lauded for his great talent in collaboration, producing macro-level results. In each act, he is an ambassador for the fusion of business strategy and enhanced built environments.
